What is the fund's objective?

The objective of the fund is to provide long-term capital growth by investing in quoted global equities and maximising investment returns in USD.

What does the fund invest in?

The fund is a feeder fund which will invest solely of participatory interests of the Melville Douglas Select Global Equity Fund. This is a high conviction, actively managed global securities fund. The fund consists of 25-35 high quality multi-national companies from around the world. Each company must comply with our stringent requirements for quality, growth and attractive valuation.

What possible risks are associated with this fund?

General market risks include a rise or volatility in bond yields, rising interest rates, economic and political risk, inflation uncertainty and duration risk. Where foreign securities are included in the portfolio there may be additional risks, such as potential constraints on liquidity and the repatriation of funds, macro-economic risks, political risks, tax risks, settlement risks, and potential limitations on the availability of market information.

Total Expense (TER): This ratio shows the charges, levies and fees relating to the management of the portfolio and is expressed as a percentage of the average net asset value of the portfolio, calculated over the period shown and annualised to the most recently completed quarter. Transaction Costs (TC): This ratio shows the percentage of the value of the fund incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the fund's underlying assets. Total Investment Charges (TIC): This ratio is simply the sum of the TER and TC, showing the percentage of the value of the fund incurred as costs relating to the investment of the fund. 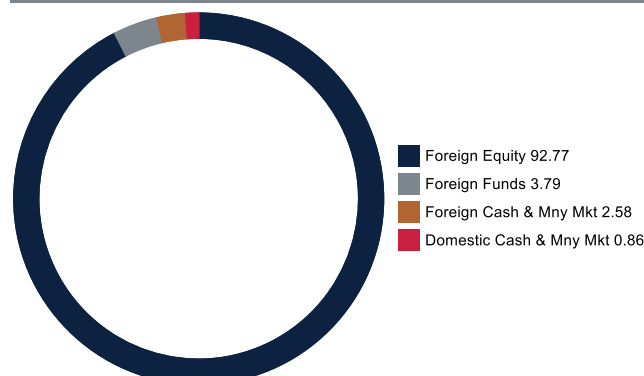

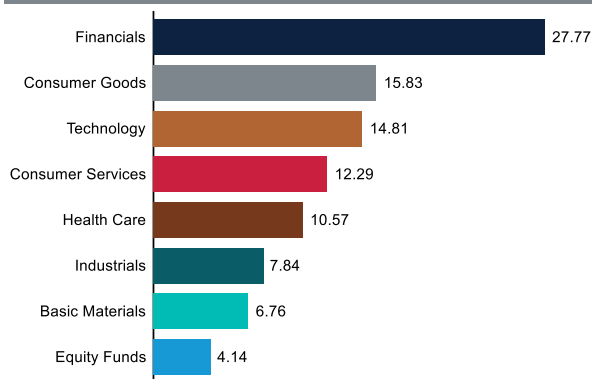

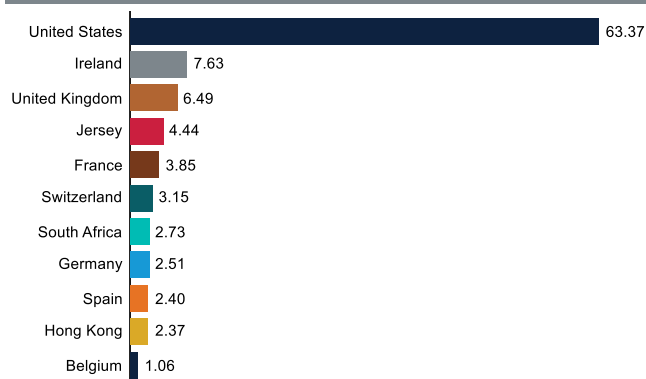
Asset allocation (look through) (%)

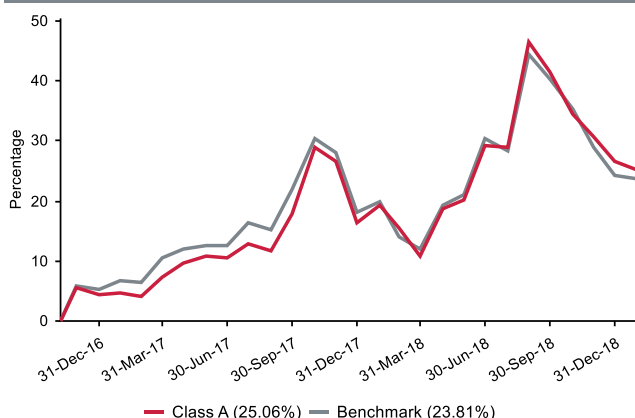

Fund review

Fund performance was dominated by a sharp and indiscriminate market de-risking. The final quarter of 2018 saw the A-class shares fall -10.73%. Over the same period the MSCI All Country World index tumbled -12.75%.

A silver lining was that the Fund outperformed its benchmark and peer group indices over the quarter as a result of positive stock selection. Losses were mitigated because the Fund tends to own relatively more stable cash generative businesses with manageable levels of financial leverage. A rare shot of caffeine amidst the market slump was provided by the holding in Starbucks. Shares of the global café chain surged +14% over the quarter on strong sales of new beverages, which included a cold coffee that looks like a pint of Guinness. Sector allocation was a wash relative to market indices because the overweight to underperforming US banks was offset by the zero weight to the energy sector. Earnings expectations for the latter were hit by the plunge in the oil price from \$85 to \$50 per barrel.

Market overview

It was a dismal quarter for global equities, which plummeted on a litany of woes primarily centered around trade wars, macroeconomic growth and Federal Reserve policy. Few sectors and geographic regions offered a safe haven from the general downdraft. Interestingly, given their fragility for much of 2018, emerging markets was the relatively better performing region amidst the turmoil in the fourth quarter.

There were growing concerns about the pace of global growth in 2019. Recent data releases in China and the Eurozone highlighted a darkening outlook, while lower US Treasury yields reflected a downbeat view of the US economy as it loses its tax cut tailwind and monetary tightening weighs on US housing activity and car sales. Furthermore, Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell stoked policy error fears by indicating little intention to tweak "autopilot" balance sheet reduction in response to slow growth data. Fed tightening will continue to act as a headwind against the "liquidity bubble in everything", which had previously driven up the price of almost all assets from cryptocurrencies, bonds, property, commodities to equities. A positive implication for active managers is that a more discerning market will likely pay more attention to investment fundamentals as it sifts the wheat from the chaff.

Looking ahead

In a reversal of fortune US equities, particularly technology and ecommerce stocks, were the worst performers amidst last month's market turmoil. Is this the onset of a trend? We are mindful US markets almost always require an economic recession for a mid-cycle "correction" to morph into a more damaging bear market. Based on historic lead times, most fundamental and market-based indicators point to a US recession occurring no earlier than mid-2020. If a recession is not on the cards in 2019, history would suggest meaningful returns would be left on the table by investors battering down the hatches today. As such, although the Fund is more cautiously positioned compared to a year ago, our base case is that the most recent sell-off was a temporary correction rather than the start of a longer-term downturn.
