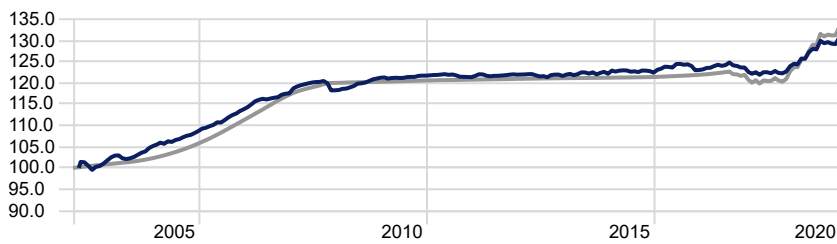

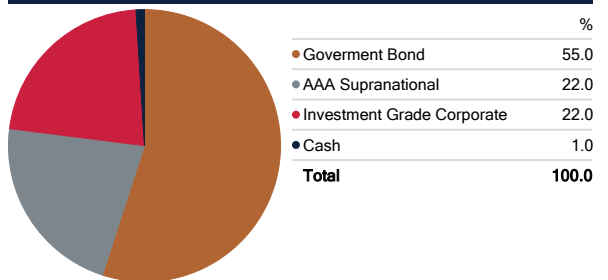
Investment Objective

Quarterly Commentary

Fund Review

The objective of the Class Fund is to provide a return in excess of its benchmark in US Dollars, whilst seeking to maintain a high degree of capital preservation, by investing primarily in quality Global fixed interest securities, and, where in the opinion of the Investment Manager, direct investment in fixed interest securities will not achieve sufficient diversification to achieve the Class Fund's objective, in other collective schemes, money market instruments and cash that will maximise total returns in US Dollars.

The Fund's performance for the period was -0.15% versus the Fund's benchmark return of 0.23%.

Market Overview

Developed market government yields have been rising since early September, in line with the fade in some factors that have helped support bond markets over recent quarters. It appears, for now at least, that worst case scenarios for both trade wars (phase one) and BREXIT have been avoided although both will remain important factors in the year ahead. The positive sentiment from recent news flow on these events has been married with some more encouraging global manufacturing data and importantly, confirmation that the US, Germany and UK have avoided recessions – the former convincingly so. Deeper, and potentially less effective, negative interest rates in the Eurozone seem to be off the cards for now amid mounting speculation that some fiscal assistance is on the horizon thanks to the affordability offered by ultra-low and often negative yields. The US Federal Reserve are telling investors that three 'insurance' interest rate cuts this year are more than enough given the ongoing broad strength in the US economy and as a result, the dreaded inversion of the yield curve (recession indicator) appears behind us for now. The direction for government yields in 2020 remains a difficult call thanks to the ever increasing geo-political influence, but fundamentally we still view global bond markets as expensive. As above, some uncertainties (trade wars/BREXIT) have eased and global central banks have loosened policy further, all whilst economic growth conditions have fared better than many expected. The icing on the cake in the period ahead could be some co-ordinated fiscal easing which would support economies without the need for even deeper interest rate cuts. The last few months has brought us encouraging signs that some key global economic data points are bouncing off their lows and a continuation of this theme in the New Year should be justification enough for yields to trend higher in the months ahead.

Looking Ahead

The record breaking length of the US economic expansion has naturally led investors to increasingly fret about the timing of the next recession. For much of 2019, their fears were heightened by ever declining US government bond yields which were all but predicting the wait wouldn't be too long. Yet, despite an understandable decline in manufacturing (which contributes less than 15% to US GDP), the economy's resilience has been very impressive. The dreaded two consecutive quarters of negative growth (recession) seem a distant prospect with the economy averaging an annualised GDP rate of 2.4% in January through September. It appears the side effects (cheaper money, higher equity markets, tighter credit spreads etc.) of the Federal Reserve's late 2018 turnaround to 'all out doves' has worked its magic and the US consumer remains resilient safe in the knowledge that the employment market remains exceptionally strong.

In the absence of the uncertainty surrounding trade wars, it remains debatable if ten-year US government bond yields would have dropped all the way down 1.46% in early September. The inability of inflation to accelerate (as previous economic equations say it should) is one reason yields, whilst off their lows, remain depressed by historical measures. Another, and perhaps more importantly for us, is the raft of global negative yielding debt which continues to exert downward pressure on US government bond yields given their somewhat ironic high (or higher yield) status. A reversal of this trend, in the form of higher German, French etc. government yields would have significant ramifications for bonds on a global scale and for this reason it is vitally important to closely watch the economic data coming out of the Eurozone and assess the timing of potential upcoming fiscal easing. Good news on both fronts would almost certainly translate into higher US government bond yields.

Despite losing some ground in the fourth quarter, the US Dollar ended the year in positive territory, albeit marginally. Although the currency continues to benefit from positive yield and interest rate differentials, the period ahead could prove more challenging as some support factors may begin to diminish. The currency has spent much of 2019 benefiting from its safe haven status in the midst of trade war uncertainty, and whilst this ongoing fractious storyline is far from over, the recent de-escalation between the US and China has been a welcome reprieve. Perhaps more importantly, and intrinsically linked, if economic growth conditions in the Eurozone can continue to show signs of stabilisation, aided by some fiscal assistance, the gap between German and US government bond yields could narrow and prompt some flows back into the Euro. Ultimately, the US Dollar remains in an enviable position although the major factor working against it is its strong rally since the credit crisis, placing it firmly in the 'profit taking' firing line. We are watching closely to see if the weakness in the final quarter was a short term correction or the start of something more sustainable with the latter prompting us to trim our long held overweight strategy.

Given our ongoing negative outlook for the US bond market and almost non-existent yield pick-up in riskier longer-dated issues, the Fund remains underweight duration relative to benchmark. Our defensive strategy has resulted in some relative underperformance to benchmark in 2019 although the Fund has delivered solid absolute returns over and above both comparable cash rates and inflation. The Fund continues to allocate to investment grade corporate debt with a mild overweight position but these holdings are directed at the shorter-end of the maturity spectrum as we remain mindful that credit spreads have tightened to near historically low levels. In addition, we continue to allocate to highly rated supranational debt over US government issues given the additional yield advantage.
